- When you're as great as I am, it's hard to be humble.

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
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another former Barry fighter were over-simplified.

Big Tongan heavyweight Paula Mataele - one of the boxers who returned with Tua - told Truth earlier this week that he got nothing more than living expenses during his spell at Barry's ranch in Nevada.

And fellow Barry fighter, former Olympic bronze medallist Shane Cameron also told Truth: "I got nothing from my stay in America."

Middleweight Maselino Masoe fought Tito Mendoza for a North American Boxing Federation title under Barry in December 2000.

"After the fight ?which was worth \$US10,000 - I got a bill and I ended up getting nothing," Masoe said.

"I was told I owed him [Barry] money. I packed up and came home. I didn't say anything. I just left. I had five, maybe six, fights in the US, I can't remember.

"None of them were for under \$US5000. At the end of them, all I had was living expenses," Masoe said.

"What you've got to understand is it's not as simple as that," Barry replied.

"These guys were drawing money every week, money for their family, sending money to Samoa.

"Everything is accounted for. Every single dollar that was taken by the fighter - pay for sparring partners, allowances for goods, trainers fees.

"When you talk about Masoe, when he was with us he never paid for any phonecalls, food or travel expenses.

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He never paid for boxing equipment or gym fees.

"They were never charged to him. Pugh and myself have invested over \$NZ31,000 in Shane and Paula."

Barry said he believed he had a good relationship with Cameron and Mataele.

"Man, I really treated them great. I went out of my way to make sure they were treated well. They were never charged for anything.

"Paula had one fight for me and I was paid \$US600. Every week that he was there [in the US] he was paid \$US100 on a Saturday.

Barry said Mataele had spent around 15 weeks in his training camp.

"Shane got \$US600 each for three fights. He was also paid \$100 a week."

Barry said Cameron had been in three US training camps for a total of around 27 weeks.

"At \$100 a week you don't have to be rocket scientist to work out I'm out of pocket. But we expected that. It was an investment."

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This could be end of the road for Tyson

LOUISVILLE, Kentucky. - Unheralded Briton Danny Williams produced one of the biggest upsets in the history of boxing when he knocked out former world champion Mike Tyson in the fourth round of their heavyweight fight on Friday.

Tyson dominated the opening round but Williams, rated a 9-1 underdog before the bout, hit back with several crunching blows and slowly began to take control against the 38-yearold American.

Williams, 31, landed with a stream of thunderous rights in the fourth before sending Tyson to the canvas after two minutes 51 seconds.

Referee Dennis Alfred halted the count to usher Williams back to his corner before stopping the fight as a groggy Tyson could barely get to his feet.

"I showed I am a warrior," Williams said. "He hurt me for a few seconds in the first round but I came back and boxed him. smart.

"I was sure I was gonna win. I knew I had the capability of beating him."

Williams said he expected Tyson to ask for a second crack at him. "I know he's gonna want a rematch," said the Briton.

Tyson went to hospital for a CAT scan immediately after the fight. He injured his left knee in the first round and may have torn ligaments, according to his trainer Freddie Roach.

"I was proud of Mike, he gave a good effort," Roach said.

"Danny surprised a lot of us. He outlasted Mike, he leaned on him, got him tired. He had a good game plan."

Tyson (50-5-2, 44 knockouts), making his ring comeback after a 17-month absence, came charging out at the start of the contest with a flurry of punches which sent Williams reeling.

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But Williams rallied in the second, swapping blows with his opponent and landing several rights to Tyson's head.

Williams was twice cautioned by Alfred in the third round, the first time for hitting after a break and opening a slight cut over Tyson's right eye, and the second for an apparent low blow.

But he continued to engage Tyson in several close-in battles, trading punches with the former champion for most of the round.

Williams (32-3, 26 knockouts) took charge in the fourth and, with a shocked crowd of 17,273 mostly Tyson fans looking on, pounded the American into the ropes late in the round.

"I cannot believe I have beaten somebody that I have been watching since I was 13," Williams said.

"I proved people wrong. They have to take me seriously now."

On the undercard, Laila Ali, fighting in her famous father Muhammad's hometown, maintained her unbeaten record by stopping super middleweight Monica Nunez in round nine.

Ali is now 18-0 with 15 knockouts.



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
